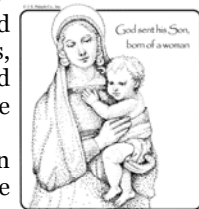

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Treasures From Our Tradition

On this feast, we can see how devotion to Mary has been a beacon of hope to the sick throughout history. In the new cathedral of Los Angeles, the faithful enter through a single door topped by a striking sculpture of Mary with arms stretched down in compassion. Sculpted into the massive bronze doors are the titles of Mary most treasured by various cultures. Many of them speak of how the sick are consoled by a sense of Mary's presence.



Dorothy Day once recalled St. Bonaventure's remark that after the Lord's long forty days of fasting in the desert, when he was diminished and weak from his struggle, the angels who ministered to him went first to the Blessed Mother's house. There they saw the soup that was on her stove, and took some to the Lord so that he would delight in it even more since his mother had prepared it. "Of course," said Dorothy Day matter-of-factly.

In praying the rosary and savoring the stories of Mary's steadfast love in the face of all suffering, the sick are strengthened by one of our tradition's most shining treasures, and the whole Church is enriched.

This Week in the Life of the Church

Being a compendium of feast days and notable events in Church history.

Sunday, January 1, 2012

✠ **We Remember: SOLEMNITY OF MARY, MOTHER OF GOD;** New Year's Day; World Day of Peace. "**But when the right time finally came, God sent his own Son. He came as the son of a human mother...**" (Gal. 4:4).

THE EARLY CHURCH REPLACED the pagan feast of the New Year, dedicated to the god Janus, with this feast honoring the Mother of God. Even before **Pope Sergius** introduced four Marian feasts in the **7th century (the Birth of Mary, the Annunciation, the Purification and the Assumption)**, the octave of Christmas was celebrated in Rome in honor of the Maternity of Mary. In later centuries, the feast of the Circumcision of Our Lord came to be observed Jan. 1, but the General Roman Calendar promulgated by **Pope Paul VI on Feb. 14, 1969**, reinstated the Marian character of this commemoration on the octave day of Christmas. In his **1974** encyclical, **Marialis Cultus**, Pope Paul said that this celebration "is meant to commemorate the part played by Mary in this mystery of salvation. It is meant also to exalt the singular dignity which this mystery brings to the 'holy Mother...through whom we were found worthy...to receive the Author of life.' It is likewise a fitting occasion for renewed adoration of the newborn Prince of Peace, for listening once more to the glad tidings of the angels, and for imploring from God, through the Queen of Peace, the supreme gift of peace. For this reason...we have instituted World Day of Peace, an observance that is gaining increasing support and is already bringing forth fruits of peace in the hearts of many." **(D,S)** • In **1484**, birth of **Huldrych Zwingli** at Wildhaus, in the Toggenburg valley of the canton of St. Gallen. Zwingli was the leader of the Protestant reformation in Switzerland; he died in **1531**.



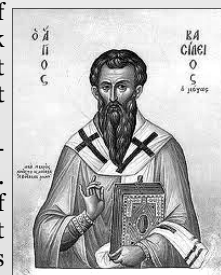
Monday, January 2, 2012

✠ **We Remember: ST. BASIL (330-379), ST. GREGORY NAZIANZEN (c.330-390).** "Byzantine saints are not very well known by most Catholics. They lived in a far different age, in a strange and different civilization. The Byzantine Empire was the first Christian nation, and most of the great events of the early Church took place there: the first Councils, the first great Doctors of the Church, the first great theological developments.

"Saints Basil and Gregory bear witness to the rich diversity of the Church. Their lives and their teachings are part of our Catholic heritage. St. Basil is the great father of monasticism, and St. Gregory is one of the great masters of mystical theology. They served God in their own age with the best tools they could find, and left their mark upon their century and upon their times.

"St. Basil stood up to the emperor, lashing at him for his inhumanity and lack of Christian principle. *No one*, said the emperor, *has ever spoken to me like that.* Apparently, said St. Basil, *you have never met a Catholic bishop.* This rare kind of courage, born of faith, was badly needed in those early days when the Church was in danger of being crushed by hostile forces.

In Basil and Gregory, the Faith found worthy champions." - Blase Schauer, O.P. (D)



Tuesday, January 3, 2012

✠ **We Remember: ST. GENEVIEVE (c.422-500).** Today's saint was born near Paris and spent her childhood tending sheep like the other shepherd children of her region, but at the age of seven, she met the saintly **Bishop Germaine (of Auxerre)**, who blessed and encouraged her. At 15, Genevieve received the veil from the bishop of Paris. She was blessed with the power of visions and the gift of prophecy. When Paris was occupied by the Franks and afterwards threatened by the Huns, St. Genevieve encouraged the people to remain firm and steadfast, to watch the enemy, to fast and do penance, and to trust in God for their welfare. **She has always been considered the special protectress and patroness of Paris.** (D,B)



✠ In 1694, of the birth of **St. Paul of the Cross** in Ovada, Italy. Paul F. Danei, founder of the **Congregation of the Passion**. The aim of the Order is twofold: to emphasize the **Passion of Christ** and to convert sinners back to Our Lord. (W)

Wednesday, January 4, 2012

✠ **We Remember: ST. ELIZABETH ANN SETON (1774-1821).** Today we celebrate the feast of the first American-born saint. She lived in Baltimore and was a wife, mother of five children, widow, teacher, and founder of the first American sisterhood - the **Sisters of Charity of St. Joseph**. Born in New York and raised a devout Episcopalian, Elizabeth received an excellent education, and from her early years manifested an unusual concern for the poor. A socialite who attended George Washington's inauguration, she was widowed at age 31. In 1805, she was received into the Church, and in 1806 confirmed by **Bishop John Carroll** of Baltimore. Besides founding the Sisters of Charity, Elizabeth is considered by some as the initiator of the American parochial school system. She was beatified in 1963 and canonized in 1975. (D,B) "In heaven," says St. Elizabeth, "we will know each other by the glance of the soul."



Thursday, January 5, 2012

✠ **We Remember: ST. JOHN NEUMANN (1811-1860).** In 1836, about 15 years after the death of St. Elizabeth Ann Seton, John Neumann came to the U.S. from Bohemia (now the Czech Republic) and was ordained a priest for the Diocese of New York. He labored in the district of Niagara until 1840, when he became a Redemptorist...the first of that religious order to make profession in the United States. He labored in Maryland, Pennsylvania, Ohio and the American frontier. In 1852, at age 41, he was ordained bishop of Philadelphia, where he worked zealously for the establishment of parochial schools and of parishes for immigrants from Europe. He also inaugurated the "40 Hours Devotion" in the United States. Possessing a special skill in languages, by the end of his life he had mastered 12. Bishop Neumann had a special love for children, the Sisters and the immigrants. **He is the first bishop from the United States to be canonized a saint** (by Pope Paul VI in 1977). (D,S,B)



Friday, January 6, 2012

✠ **We Remember: BLESSED ANDRE BESSETTE (1845-1937).** Today's saint was the founder of **St. Joseph's Oratory** in Montreal, Canada, perhaps the world's principle shrine to St. Joseph. "**Frere Andre**" was eighth child in a family of 12, and was orphaned at the age of 12; he tried his hand at several

trades but was not successful with any of them. He could barely read and write and was sickly most of his life. At age 15, he became a Brother of the Holy Cross, but was rejected at the end of the novitiate. The bishop of Montreal, however, insisted that Br. Andre be allowed to make his religious profession. For 40 years, he worked as a porter at the College of Notre Dame, until he was needed full time at the shrine of St. Joseph. People from all over Canada came to him for cures and spiritual direction, and he has been credited with thousands of cures. The Oratory was solemnly dedicated in 1955 and raised to the rank of a minor basilica.



If one were to seek the outstanding virtue of Br. Andre, it was his humility. He once said: "I am ignorant. If there were anyone more ignorant, the good God would choose him in my place." And when the power of healing was attributed to him, he responded: "It is St. Joseph who cures. I am only his little dog." (S) ✠ In 1412, the birth of **St. Joan of Arc** in Domremy, France; patron of France. • In 1494, the first formal Mass in the New World. The Mass was celebrated by Fr. Bernardo Boyl who accompanied Christopher Columbus on his second voyage. (W)

Saturday, January 7, 2012

✠ **We Remember: ST. RAYMOND OF PENYAFORT (c. 1175-1275).** A renowned expert in canon and civil law, St. Raymond also worked hard for the formation of priests and the evangelization of Jews and Muslims. He encouraged missionaries to learn Arabic and to study the Koran in order to enter into dialogue with Islam. A kinsman of the kings of Aragon, he joined the Dominicans in 1222; he was called to Rome by **Pope Gregory IX** and in 1234 completed his five books of the Decretals, systematizing and codifying the canon law; this remained the most authoritative codification of ecclesiastical legislation till 1917!

✠ In 1131, the death of **St. Canute Lavard** in Denmark; a Danish prince, he spent his life preaching Christianity to the German tribes and was assassinated by his cousin. (W)
• Today is also the birth of **St. Bernadette Soubirous** in Lourdes, France, in 1844. Born into a poor family, she was the humble and obedient little girl chosen by the Blessed Virgin to hear her announcement, "I am the Immaculate Conception."
• In 1894, of the birth of **St. Maximilian Kolbe** in Zdunska Wola, Poland. A Franciscan, he died in the Auschwitz Concentration Camp. (W)
