BAPTISMAL DEATH AND RESURRECTION

As we celebrate the Baptism of the Lord, we also honor our own baptism

as our initiation into the Christian life and community. In the Gospel, the baptism of Jesus, with his immersion and then emergence from the water, points to his later submission to God at his death, and his emergence from the grave at his resurrection. This pattern of death and resurrection is our path too, as followers of Jesus. Throughout life, often in small ways, we learn to surrender our limited and self-centered agendas. This surrender often feels like



death. The sacrament of Baptism ritually enacts this pattern to remind us of Jesus' death and resurrection, so that we too might embrace the deaths and resurrections of our own lives. As Jesus emerged from the water, he encountered his Father and the Holy Spirit. Like Jesus, we can know we are God's beloved, empowered by the Spirit. Copyright © J. S. Paluch Co.

This Week in the life of the Church - Feast days and Notable Events in Church history

Sunday, January 9, 2022

THE BAPTISM OF OUR LORD: The Catechism of the Catholic Church says of the Baptism of Jesus: His eternal messianic consecration was revealed during the time of his earthly life at the moment of his baptism by John, when "God anointed Jesus of Nazareth with the Holy Spirit and with power," "that he might be revealed to Israel" (Acts 10:38, Jn 1:31) as its Messiah. His works and words will manifest him as "the Holy One of God." (Mk 1:24, Jn 6:69, Acts 3:14).

★ We Remember: ST. PETER OF SEBASTE (c. 391), a native of Cappadocia, and younger brother of St. Basil and St. Gregory of Nyssa; Peter succeeded Basil as abbot and in 380 was appointed bishop of Sebaste in Armenia. He took part in the general council of Constantinople (381). (D,B) • On JAN. 9, 1522, POPE ADRIAN VI, the last non-Italian pope prior to Pope John Paul II (and the only Dutchman), was elected to the papacy. It was a huge surprise. Adrian was the Cardinal of Utrecht and hadn't even attended the consistory; he was in Spain. Though Pope Adrian was reform-minded and sought changes (reducing the splendor of the papal court and cutting back on cardinals' privileges and incomes), he was an outsider, not even able to speak Italian. And, as the first pope to face the full impact of Martin Luther's challenge, he misjudged the reformer, thinking him an obstinate and heretical monk who could be addressed with the usual applications of force and penalty. ©

Monday, January 10, 2022

‡ We Remember: ST. WILLIAM OF BOURGES (died 1209) served as abbot to many French monasteries before becoming Archbishop of Bourges in **1200**. He made a great many converts among the Albigensians and was in much demand as a confessor. Pope Honorius III canonized William in 1217. (D,B) • In 1944, the death of Fr. JOSEPH SCHMIDLIN in Breuschtal Concentration Camp, Germany. After majoring in history and being ordained, he taught history for a number of years. About 1908, his interests turned to missions and missionaries. Fr. Schmidlin almost single-handedly developed this interest into a science - that of missiology. He authored numerous works including mission histories, thus combining his life's two interests. When the Nazi government took control of Germany, Fr. Schmidlin was dismissed from his post and forbidden to teach. He was arrested a number of times for determinedly trying to continue his work, and finally executed for defying the state. (W) • In 1970, the decree by the Vatican Congregation for the Clergy announcing that bishops may institute Masses on Saturday afternoons or evenings to fulfill the Sunday obligation was issued. Although the decree stated bishops may do so if they deem it necessary or useful, the idea quickly became popular and a standard practice. It proved beneficial to both clergy and laity and offered new opportunities for many people to attend Mass. (W)

• In 1984: Establishment of full diplomatic relations between the <u>HOLY SEE AND THE USA</u>. William A. Wilson was named American Ambassador to the Vatican and Archbishop Pio Laghi was named Papal Nuncio to the US. The official announcement stated that the formal governmental link was begun "to develop mutually friendly relations already existing." (W)

Tuesday, January 11, 2022

† We Remember: ST. THEODOSIUS THE CENOBIARCH (c. 423-529) was influenced by St. Simeon Stylites, the famous and colorful religious ascetic who lived on a pillar in the Syrian desert for 36 years. Theodosius, in his quest for the religious life, visited all the holy shrines of Jerusalem as a penitent and prayerful pilgrim. He then chose the monastic life rather than a hermitage. Theodosius was put in charge of the church of Our Lady situated on the road between Jerusalem and Bethlehem. He next founded a monastery in the desert of Judah by the Dead Sea, where several hundred monks were soon living under his rule. The patriarch of Jerusalem appointed him **visitor** to all the cenobitical communities in Palestine, whence the title **cenobiarch** given to the saint. The Byzantine emperor tried unsuccessfully to bribe Theodosius to support a heresy known as **monophysitism**. The saint died at the remarkable age of **105**.

Wednesday, January 12, 2022

† We Remember: St. Marguerite Bourgeoys (1620-1700) left the cultural center of France in 1653 for the rugged wilderness of Canada (then a French possession). Marguerite tutored the children of the French garrison of Montreal, consoling young families in their trials, teaching women to cook, sew, and care for their families in the wilderness. She converted the governor's stable into a schoolhouse where she taught both French and Indian children to read, write, count, and about God and His special love for them. In 1688, she founded the Sisters of Notre Dame de Montreal. This woman who spent her life serving the needy and caring for poor families of her community was canonized by Pope John Paul II on Oct. 31, 1982. (S)

Thursay, January 13, 2022

***** We Remember: ST. HILARY, BISHOP AND DOCTOR (315-367) was born at Poitiers in France. Married and the father of a saintly daughter named Abia, Hilary was converted to the Christian faith by reading the Scriptures, especially the Prologue to the St. John's Gospel. While still a layman, Hilary was elected bishop of Poitiers, fighting strenuously against the Arian heresy. He became the first theologian of the Latin Church to combat this heresy and to introduce into the language of the West the preciseness of Catholic doctrine and Greek thought. Hilary suffered exile at the hands of the pro-Arian emperor. After his return, he had the courage to protest vigorously against the emperor's unwarranted intervention in religious matters. Under Hilary, that the clergy recognized more and more that even in a Christian state, the Church must be separate and independent. Hilary wrote extensively, composed several liturgical hymns, and helped **St. Martin of Tours** promote the monastic life. (B)

Friday, January 14, 2022

We Remember: **St. Felix of Nola:** "In poverty we should be the more secure of possessing Christ," says Felix, who gave away his fortune to the poor. Son of a Romano-Syrian soldier who had settled at Nola (near Naples), Felix was ordained a priest and devoted himself to his bishop, St. Maximus. When Emperor Decius began persecuting Christians around 250, Maximus went into hiding in a cave, but Felix was arrested, tortured and imprisoned. Released by an angel who flooded his cell with brilliant light, Felix located his beloved bishop and carried the sick old man back home to be nursed. A later bishop of Nola, St. Paulinus, wrote us a poem with a glowing account of the popular veneration of St. Felix. Paulinus assures us that, in Heaven, Felix has a special sympathy for innocent victims of false testimony, and so is the patron invoked against perjury. (D,B,S2) # ST. SAVA (1174-1237), patron saint of Serbia. Sava went to the famous Greek monastery of Mt. Athos but returned to Serbia to settle a civil war. He remained to unify the nation by translating sacred texts into its language. ●In 1892, the birth of MARTIN (FRIEDRICH GUSTAV EMIL) NIEMÖLLER, Confessing Pastor, and author of this famous quote: "When the Nazis came to get the Communists, I was silent, because I was not a Communist. When they came to get the Socialists, I was silent. When they came to get the Catholics, I was silent. When they came to get the Jews, I was silent. And when they came to get me, there was no one left to speak."

Saturday, January 15, 2022

‡ We Remember: St. PAUL THE EGYPTIAN (c. 240-352) fled to the desert of Thebes at age 22 to escape the persecution of Decius, according to St. Jerome, who is our sole source for the life of this saint. Paul stayed there in the desert even after the persecutions ended...in fact, he stayed in the desert for 90 years, until his death. He was the first in a long succession of the Desert Fathers, holy men in search of solitude and a place for heavenly contemplation.(D,B) + Another Desert Father memorialized today is ST. MACARIUS the Great (c. 300-390). Disciple of the desertdwelling St. Anthony, Macarius was once asked "How should one pray?" The old man said, "There is no need to make long discourses; it is enough to stretch out one's hands and say, Lord, as you will, and as you know, have mercy. And if the conflict grows fiercer say, LORD, HELP! He knows very well what we need and he shows us mercy." + ST. ITA (c. 570): Widely venerated in Ireland, St. Ita (also known as Ida, Mida or Deirdre) holds the foremost place among her country's women saints after St. Brigid. Of royal descent, she was born at Waterford and won her father's consent to lead a life of virginity. In Limerick, she founded a community of women dedicated to God; she also founded a school for boys One of her pupils was St. Brendan, who became a famous abbot and missionary. He once asked Ita what three things God especially loved. She replied, "True faith in God with a pure heart, a simple life with a religious spirit, and openhandedness inspired by charity." (L,P,G) + January 15 is the birthday of Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. (1929-1968), Baptist minister who championed the civil rights movement in the U.S. awarded the Nobel Peace Prize in 1964, assassinated in 1968. The civic holiday which commemorates Dr. King's birth is observed next Monday,
